Key Ideas The seasons together with climate and weather can shape the physical geography (such as habitats and landscapes) and human geography (such as settlement and land use) of a place. Seasons change throughout the year because of the way the earth moves around, the sun. It means the amount of sunlight we get changes during the year which gives rise to the seasons. The United Kingdom has four seasons (spring, summer, fall, and winter) that follow one another regularly. Each has its own light, temperature, and weather patterns that repeat yearly. There are six main types of air masses that affect the British Isles. We name these air masses after the area in which they originate. They are classified as continental or maritime - dependent on whether they originate over land or sea - and arctic or antarctic, equatorial, tropical, or polar, depending on the particular region in which they form. The effect they have on us changes over the different seasons. THE COMPASS: The four main directions on the compass are North, East, South, West.
