#### In the classroom this week .....

It has been lovely to visit each of the classes this week to see them busy and settling in. The children have been completing a range of 'welcome-back' activities as well as revising their arithmetic and handwriting skills. The curriculum will be in full swing next week with lessons starting promptly at 8:45am on Monday morning. We look forward to all the amazing work that we know the children will create. Next week will see the start of our Celebration Collective Worship on Fridays where we celebrate the achievements of our pupils. If you child has won anything out side of school and would like to bring in any trophies, medals, badges or certificates, please feel free to bring them along to our Friday assemblies where they can share them with the rest if the school.

## **Attendance Ambassadors**

Each class will be electing an Attendance Ambassador next week who will support staff in the promotion of good attendance in school. They will each receive a badge for their role which they can wear on their school tie or jumper. These will be handed out in next Friday's Celebration Collective Worship.

## **School Attendance**

Good attendance is a crucial part of children reaching their full potential in school. We look to celebrate it each week with our school attendance mascot, Barney Bear, being awarded to the class with the highest attendance. We also give out attendance certificates at the end of each term to give everyone a clear understanding of what the attendance figures for the children are.

The school's attendance target is 95%. If your child is at school for only 90 per cent of the school year, then they will have missed almost four whole weeks of school. This is a big gap for any child to make up. For any children whose attendance falls under 90%, we will be asking for medical proof in order to authorise any absence due to illness. Without satisfactory medical proof, the absence will be unauthorised.

<u>Please note that the school's attendance policy clearly sets out that no absence for term time holidays</u> <u>will be authorised. This means that if children are missing school due to a term time holiday, it will be recorded as unauthorised absence.</u>

Please be aware that there is a single National Threshold for when a penalty notice must be considered by all schools in England and Wales of 10 sessions of unauthorised absence within a rolling 10 school week period. These sessions do not have to be consecutive and can be made up of any type of unauthorised absences.

Fines for school absences across the country will be £160 discounted to £80 if paid within 21 days, or £160 if paid within 28 days. If a parent receives a second fine for the same child within any three-year period, this will be charged at the higher rate of £160 with no discount given for early repayment.

Should a third absence be taken within the three-year period, a parent may be summonsed to the Magistrates Court for knowingly failing to secure good attendance at school (Section 444 (1A) of Education Act 1996).

#### Summer Building Work

It was a busy time in school over the summer with lots of maintenance taking place. Our school site officer, Mr Wakerley, has been working very hard over the summer to make the building fresh and ready for everyone's return this week. He has been very busy painting and varnishing all of the wooden fences around the school and I hope you will join me in thanking him for his efforts. The school pathways have also been tarmacked over the summer meaning no more pavestones!

#### PE days

Our PE days starts next week for all our classes. On their PE days, the children should come into school wearing their school uniform PE kit. The school PE kit is a plain white tee-shirt or polo shirt with navy blue shorts or track-suit trousers and plain trainers. The children should also come to school wearing their school jumper or cardigan (not their own sweaters or hoodies please)

The PE days are as follows: Monday – Y6. Tuesday – Y3 & Reception. Wednesday – Y1. Thursday – Y2. Friday – Y5.

Our Y4 class will be going swimming each Tuesday. The Y4 children can, if they want to, wear a polo shirt as part of their school uniform on their swimming day to make changing at the pool a little easier. They should also bring their swimming kit (towel, swimming costume and swimming hat) in a bag to take to the pool.

#### **After-School Sports Clubs**

We will have a range of after-school sports clubs going on over this coming term. There is no charge for attendance at these clubs. All the clubs run from 3.15 to 4.15pm and the children can be collected from the hall doors at the end of the club.

Tuesday: UK Sports Multi-Skills club for Y1 & Y2 – this is now full. The Y1 children can take part in the club wearing their school uniform.

Wednesday: UK Sports Multi-Sports club for Y3 & Y4 – this is now full. The children should bring sports clothes in a bag for the club.

Wednesday: Netball club for Y5 & Y6 run by Mrs Mackay—there are spaces in the club. The children should bring sports clothes in a bag for the club.

Thursday: Football club for Y6 run by Mr Houston – there are spaces in the club. The children should bring sports clothes in a bag for the club.

#### **After-School Activity Clubs**

Reading out aloud helps children with their fluency and expression and is vital, especially for our younger children, in their development. Thank you for your support with this.

## Our Christian values and thoughtful time .....

## **Collective Worship Theme**

Our collective worship is based upon a set of sixteen Christian values that we cover over a three-year cycle. We spend half a term looking at each value in our daily act of collective worship. The value that we will be looking at this half-term is 'Justice'. Each week the children look at different aspects of this value and what it means to them in their daily lives. In our weekly thoughtful book assembly, we share some of these ideas with the school. Attached to this newsletter is a sheet about this value so you can support the work the children are doing in collective worship at home. We hope you find the ideas useful as you explore the value together and have fun doing it!

## **Courageous Advocates**

As part of our collective worship programme, we look to give the children an opportunity each half-term to speak up about an issue that they feel passionate about. They can prepare what they want to say at home and then tell the rest of the school about it during our courageous advocates worship. They can do this either in a small group or by themselves. We are always really impressed by what they have to say and the passion they show for the issues that they are talking about. Our first courageous advocates worship is on 16<sup>th</sup> October. If any child wants to talk part they should speak to their class teacher or Mrs Walker about it.

## **Home Worship Books**

Every infant and junior child has been given a home worship book to take home. They can put into it any thoughts, reflections or prayers they have in whatever form they want to – drawings, writing or photos. This can be linked into the school's weekly worship themes or be something that has come from the child. If they want to, they can then bring their books into the weekly Thoughtful Book worship and share them with the rest of the school. The first chance they have to do this is next Thursday – 10<sup>th</sup> September. Each week we will choose one of the children to look after Sammy (our home worship mascot). We will also take a copy of their work to keep in our special school home worship book which is on display in the hall.

## Lady Justice

Lady **Justice** is one of the most famous landmarks in London. It is a bronze statue that stands on the domed roof of the Old Bailey. This building houses the central criminal courts where people who are accused of breaking

the law are tried by a judge and jury to find out if they are 'guilty' and should be punished or 'not guilty' and can go free.

Lady **justice** was designed to be a symbol of **justice**: in her left hand she carries the scales of truth and fairness and in her right hand a double edged sword representing the power of reason and **justice**.
